FINAL ORDER

Upon the Findings of Fact this date entered, and for the reasons set out more fully in the concurrent Opinion this date issued, this Commission concludes as a matter of law that:


1. The terms of the treaty of June 14, 1866 (14 Stat. 785) between the Creek Nation and the United States were not the product of any negotiations by representatives of the United States which could be characterized as tainted by a want of fair and honorable dealings.


2. The said terms of the said treaty were supported by consideration, on the part of the United States, which was substantial and adequate.


3. The said terms of the said treaty did not represent, and were not a product of, a breach of fiduciary duty owed one enemy, the United States, to its enemy, the Creek Nation, during the Civil War.

It is therefore ordered that this claim be, and it is hereby, dismissed.
