INTERLOCUTORY ORDER

Upon the findings of fact and opinion filed herein, and hereby made a part of this order, the Commission concludes as a matter of law:

1. That the plaintiff Seneca-Cayuga Tribe of Oklahoma is entitled to maintain this action;
2. That the Cayuga Nation had a compensable property interest in the lands it sold to New York State by the treaties entered into July 27, 1795, and May 30, 1807; and
3. That the defendant will be liable under the Indian Claims Commission Act and the Trade and Intercourse Act if the Cayuga Nation received unconscionable consideration for its lands.

This docket will proceed to a determination of value and consideration.


